Message from our Chair Sandra Muriel

I suspect many of you will be wondering where the summer has gone. Shearing, birthing, CCA fleece show, farm visitors and this year for the first time, I decided to rent our shepherds hut for short 'alpaca farm' guests. As well as the fun of staying in our hut, the guests could sit out in one of the paddocks in the evenings with the alpacas, watching the sunsets over St. Ives - which one guest described as a fairy tale. Listening to our visitors, made me realise just how lucky we are to live in Cornwall, in the countryside with peace and space.

We were shortlisted for the **Duke of Cornwall 2021 award** - an honour in itself and whilst we did not take the first place I was pleased to be recognised. A team from the Royal Cornwall Show committee visited to see where I have diversified and grown our business and see our future potential. Whilst here, I was able to discuss possibilities for an 'alpaca' section at future Royal Cornwall shows which was warmly received.



We have had more visitors than ever since we opened the gates early July, lots of families and friends, some of whom have visited us before. The cria were the star attractions, it was hard to walk beyond their paddock as people loved taking photos and watching their antics; our yearlings did very good meet and greets with the public and became experts at posing for selfies with the visitors. Our alpaca yarn sales have soared this year as we have had a wider range of yarn weights spun. I am really proud to be able to offer a range of natural black yarns, from 2 ply to chunky including our own new blend of huacaya/suri, which has been the culmination of 5 years collecting our best black fleeces.

Our 2nd **CCA Fleece Show** was a tremendous success, there is more details later in the newsletter. It is fair to say I was extremely pleased to win the CCA member Best in Show Huacaya trophy, with our light female Cherie scoring 79.5 points and the 2nd highest scoring CCA member huacaya fleece was our junior white girl Fauve who scored 78.5 points. Congratulations to Pophams for the CCA member Best in Show suri fleece.

I am disappointed there were no craft or yarn shows this year, previously SWAG and Heart of England groups have run autumn shows but not this year. I am informed that Heart of England will be having their craft show at the spring halter show, so they can have a better display. This does give anyone interested the winter months to plan and craft some entries.



The Committee have met via zoom, to ensure that we continue to offer you the newsletters, keep the Facebook page and website up to date, run the account and plan future events. We are planning a **Vets Day on 30th October**, to be kindly hosted by Gary and Felicia at Pophams, subject to any changes in covid restrictions. After missing last year, it has a feeling of returning to normality to have a vets day. More details will later in the newsletter; tickets are on a first come, first served basis and it usually is full very quickly.

On 23rd November, Nigel has arranged a **Zoom talk by GWF** who produce Camelibra and Fibregest, to discuss nutrition...more info later in the newsletter.



CORNISH FLEECE SHOW 2021 Sandra Muriel, CCA Chair and Wendy Scott, CCA Secretary


With Covid restrictions starting to ease, it was great to be able to hold the Cornish Fleece Show in July. The show was sold out within days and it was great to have both returning and new entrants from across the country.

Judge Roger Clarke commended the high quality of the entries.

"Kicking off the 2021 summer show scene, I enjoyed the privilege of judging the 2nd Cornish Fleece Show.

Hosted by Dark Sky Alpacas, the entire event was a credit to the Cornwall Camelid Association and testament to all their hard work and planning.

As expected, the standard of entries was very high and it was a genuine pleasure to appraise such stunning fleeces."



Of the 74 huacaya entries, 10 fleeces scored over 80 points. Only 18 fleeces scored less than 70 points. The largest class was the junior white fleeces, attracting 13 entries including the overall Supreme. It shows the high quality of the entries, when the fleece which came 7th and not awarded any rosette scored 78.5 points. In the Suri section, Beck Brow Falco (owned by Sheriff Alpacas) scored 83.5 points and the Supreme Suri sash. Although there were only 6 suri fleeces entered, all scored in the upper 70 points.

It was good to see a few entries from owners new to fleece showing and we hope that they enjoyed receiving their fleeces back with their score cards and hopefully a rosette. Roger endeavoured to make constructive comments on as many entries as possible, explaining where some extra points were gained or lost.

This year we awarded a cup each to the CCA members with the highest scoring huacaya and suri fleeces. The highest scoring huacaya fleece by a CCA member was awarded to Crewenna Cherie, 48 months+ light fleece scoring 79.5 points and the highest scoring suri fleece entered by a CCA member was awarded to Popham Surimandara, 12-24 months light fleece scoring 79.5 points.



The team of CCA member stewards, Ros (Sampford Manor Alpacas), Nigel (Carpalla Alpacas), Abha (Powwow Alpacas), Lin (Linberry Alpacas) and Sandra (Crewenna Alpacas), worked tirelessly in shifts during the day, to keep the flow of entries carefully placed on the tables ready for judging and ensuring all were repacked with the correct score cards and samples. Last year's successful partnership of Tom on computer recording the scores and Wendy (Dark Sky Alpacas) scribing kept this years show rolling, even with 20 more entries

the show finished mid afternoon. We also had Barry (Linberry Alpacas) enrolled as transport manager to guarantee the safe transport of the fleeces to and from the collection point to the venue.

After the judging, the show was open to members to come and view the entries, collect their fleeces and also benefit from a summary and general question and answer session with Roger. It was great to be able to reconnect in person and enjoyed by all.

Many thanks to Roger and all the helpers and we look forward to next year.

FARM OPEN DAY Rosalind Pugh, Sampford Alpacas



When BAS first mentioned the Open Days to promote Alpacas the dates seemed a long way off. I thought it would make a goal for getting my new field sorted. A good idea that didn't quite come off, but there was mains water put into the field 3 days before the event!

Another reason for doing it was to meet more of my neighbours as I moved less than a year ago. I did some local leafleting and did a stall at the local Chapel coffee morning which seemed to work. Various family and friends did some online promoting. I missed a call about local radio and T.V. but I was happy with the numbers that came, 132 in all. More advertising will get you more punters, but as I only have 18 alpacas now it was all fine

A risk assessment and other planning was essential, I already had Public Liability Insurance. The 6 different family and friends who kindly helped each day, were all needed. I just floated, talking about alpacas to whoever wanted to listen!

On offer was:

- 1. Stroking alpacas safely behind a hurdle, for more brave people several youngsters could be walked around on leads. Followed by being directed to the tap and soap area.
- 2. A children's play area with large wooden building blocks, often used by fathers, also popular was the croquet set up. (safer than cricket or football) and the chickens and runner ducks shown off by my grandson.

- 4. The stall set up with squash and cakes did good business also the one with my knitted and other products made from my herd. Because of Covid 19 I did not encourage hands plunged into fleece, but a small amount to take home is always popular with youngsters.

The feedback was good with orders for garments in a particular colour and bookings for visits for 'alpaca experiences'. We had one visitor in high heels who asked to look at the chickens then left, another wanted tea, but it wasn't on offer as there is no electricity.



I was delighted to see the CCA members who came, hopefully someone else will do it in Cornwall next year, and I will visit them.



CAMELIDYNAMICS COURSEWendy Scott, Dark Sky Alpacas

In mid September, Marty McGee Bennett taught a rare four day clinic at Kate Brookes' farm, Mullacott Alpacas. Marty is based in the US and is the inventor of the CAMELIDynamics training system for camelids which is based on the science of behaviour and her brand of animal understanding. As she explains on her website, it is the result of over 30 years of experience and is a collection of methods that represent the



most positive least intrusive techniques for training and managing camelids.

She was ably assisted by Victoria Barrett who is a Senior Camelidynamics Consultant based in Worcester.

In total there were 40 attendees at the clinic from all over the UK, including CCA members myself, Heather Lester, Mark and Sam Norman and of course Kate with her husband Simon – and we hopefully found a new member in Clare who is based near Helston.

The principles on which all Marty's work is based are to be **Kind, Safe, Respectful, Efficient, FUN and Based on Science** - which are hard to argue with and great to keep in mind with all our alpaca interactions.



During the course, we had a good amount of theory and even more practice – where a lot of the practice involved us being the alpaca! This sounds a bit mad but I found it to be one of the most insightful part of the programme – feeling what it may be like to be on a halter and to be pulled or pushed around, what feeling balanced and out of balance was like – all very interesting and thought provoking.

We did also have the opportunity to work with some of Kate's wonderful alpacas – learning to lead with the boys through obstacle courses out in the fields (with a tremendous view to the sea to boot) was a real highlight. This is Mark at work...



And loads more content that I couldn't do justice! In addition, there was an evening swim and a spinning and weaving session - in which Sam managed to grab some great advice for her new spinning wheel – and lots of chance to meet and learn from new alpaca friends.

WELFARE

Top Autumn Husbandry Tips

- 1. Buy in and ensure you have enough hay to last through the winter months
- 2. Check stocks and commence **vitamin supplements** where required especially dark coated/pregnant/young/old
- 3. Ensure adequate **winter accommodation** is available and secured against winds if 'mobile'
- 4. Body score, check jaws, teeth and toenails, look for evidence of mites.
- 5. Make sure cria have been **vaccinated** against clostridial disease, to include booster 3-4 weeks after initial vaccination
